We need some Christians crazy enough to believe that children don't have to go to bed hungry; that the world doesn't have to be the way it often seems to be; that there is a way to lay down our swords and shields, and crazy enough to believe that every human being has been created in the image of God, and we are all equally children of God and meant to be treated as such. *

I challenge you to continue to be just a little crazy as you envision our church's future and what it means to be a Christian in the world today. And I recommend that you add Michael Curry's book, **Crazy Christians** *A Call to Follow Jesus,* to your summer reading list.

It could also be the topic for a summer Study group. Let me know if you are interested.

A COMMUNITY BASED GIVING AND SHARING PROGRAM SPONSORED BY THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF BIG FLATS, NY



The "Shared Blessings" program at our church is working hard to provide a store for local people who are in need of clothing, personal hygiene supplies, some home goods, and other supplies. We are trying to get the space and paper work together so we can offer this program soon at our church for our local community. We are asking the community to get involved, whether that be donations or volunteering or simply keeping your ears and eyes open for someone who is in need. We hope to work through referrals from the local community or companies. This is in the beginning stages and our hope is to have it available in the next couple months -- we will keep everyone informed. We are hoping that this becomes infectious and we will be able to get the whole community involved, not just our church members. Most of us are very fortunate, but there are plenty of people in our own community that do need help. As we continue to work this out we have also decided to tackle a community mission project each month.

- May's Mission a Mother's Day Crib filled with donations was given to a deserving young single mother in our community.
- June's Mission Goodie Bags were filled with homemade cookies and given to the Horseheads Bus Garage and the Big Flats Elementary School.

UPCOMING EVENTS:

 July's Mission – Thursday and Friday, July 19th and 20th -- our church needs volunteers to help pass out free nutritious lunches to our children.



Almost 8000 children in Chemung County are enrolled in free or reduced priced meals during the school year, and many have no lunch available when school is not in session. The state provides a lunch at several different parks in Elmira, and we are set up to pass out lunch bags at Blandford Park in Elmira on these dates. Anyone interested can just show up at the park at 11:45 on either or both days.

- July's Mission We are also collecting pairs of shoes during July and will be continuing to do this throughout the year if successful. This program helps other countries develop entrepreneurial experience as well as providing shoes at a low cost to their communities. The Shared Blessings program will also benefit by getting paid for the shoes. We hope this will help us to be able to buy items needed at the community store.
- August Mission Friday, August 3rd our church has partnered with Corning Incorporated to offer a picnic at the Bath VA Hospital for our Veterans. Corning Inc. will supply all the food, and we need volunteers to help set up, cook, serve and clean up. Times are: Set up and Cooking 9:00 a.m. to 11:00; Serving 11:00 1:00; Clean Up 1:00 3:00; Visiting with Veterans from 11:00 to 1:00. You can come for an hour or stay the whole day!

PNC UPDATE

The Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) has the ultimate responsibility for nominating a minister to the congregation for election as our next pastor. The work of the PNC involves many different tasks and responsibilities as we work our way through the call process.

Just to bring you all up to date, our Minister Information Form (MIF) was presented to the Presbytery of Geneva's Committee on Ministry (COM) on May 1st in Penn Yan. Pat Fitzgerald, Sheila French and I made the trip together.

After a brief discussion with the COM members, our MIF was approved. However, they asked us to make two slight changes to answers on two of the narrative questions which we have since done. This slightly revised



MIF was then presented, as required, to Session at the May meeting when it was given their final approval.

After that, due to some serious health issues which came up with three of our PNC members (myself included), I had to make the decision to put the work of the PNC on a temporary hold. I notified Presbytery, and they were fully supportive of this decision.

I sent Presbytery our final approved MIF, and it was left that they would enter it on the Christian Leadership Connection (CLC) whenever I notify them that our PNC is once again able to meet on a regular basis.

Once our MIF is entered on the CLC website, I will begin receiving Personal Information Forms (PIFs) from potential candidates. Our PNC will then evaluate each and every one of these. This part of the call process may take quite some time or it may not, depending on what type of candidates we hear from and whether or not we think they might be a good fit with our congregation.

We strongly encourage all members of the congregation to look at the enlarged flow chart for the call process which is posted on our church house bulletin board. This chart will help you to better understand how the call process works. It is a lengthy process.

As we proceed through the various required tasks on the chart, we will mark a large X through each box once that task has been completed. This will allow all of you to see what the PNC has already accomplished while at the same time allowing you to see what we still have ahead of us to complete.

Please pray for the PNC, and also remember that it is "God's own choice" who will be our next pastor.
