

Dear Friends,

I recently attended a memorial service for a man who was eulogized as having had great skill as a coach in both basketball and life.

I listened intently hoping to glean what I could from the words his loving brother spoke, for just recently it had dawned on me that in this phase of my time here as interim pastor, my role should be one of coach rather than "player." But then it came to me that all pastors should be coaches and that indeed at times even the members of the congregation are called upon to be coaches. So in this letter I would like to say a few words about coaching in our community of faith, this church



At its core, coaching is about relationships. It is about connecting people to their highest aspirations, potential, and passions. Coaching is a means by which we can help people plug in to their dreams, calling, and design, and help them discover the actions that will move them forward.

A church is a place where these connections can be made. Ask people for their definition of church, and responses will be varied, ranging from the Body of Christ to the building with the steeple. But actually we can simply look to Matt. 9: 9-13 for Jesus' own definition which can be paraphrased as imperfect people who know they needed a Savior, working together to build relationships, help those in need, and to glorify God by striving to be like Christ and share His love with others.

Churches may not be businesses or basketball teams, but they have a purpose for their existence and a responsibility to their community, in deed to the world, and they have a need to succeed. I do believe that adding coaching to the skill set will be of benefit to all as we transition to a culture of coaching culture.

Bill Copper the author of *Faith Coaching* writes that coaching is a mindset – a fundamental belief in the worth, capabilities and motivation of others. Coaches believe in other people and their value which includes their inherent set of talents passion and potential.

In a church, coaching is interacting with people as Christ did with his disciples as he modeled being patient, kind, aware, awake, inclusive, supportive, encouraging, and empowering. It includes asking questions, really listening, action planning and giving affirmation.

What would this church be like if all were intentional about their gifts and how they might be used for the betterment of this blessed community?

I will have printouts in the office for anyone interested in learning more about coaching. Our goal may be heaven on earth, but the joy can also be in the journey.

DUANE WELCH (1930 – 2018)

Duane Welch passed away on September 11, 2018, at the age of eighty-eight. He was born March 28, 1930, and was raised in Corning, NY. After attending the University of Colorado, he served in the US Navy before going to work for Corning Incorporated. He worked for Corning Inc. for some forty-two years, serving in a number of capacities and travelling around the world many times. Duane was an integral part of our faith community. He sang in our choir for over forty years, was a vital member of our Worship Committee, and was instumental in a number of projects within our church. Duane is survived by his wife, June, son, Craig, and by his two grandaughters. He was a good man, a friend to all in our congregation, and he will be missed.

DUDLEY SHEA (1927 – 2018)

Dudley Shea passed away on October 7, 2018, at the age of eighty-three. He was born on November 17, 1934, in Corning, NY. He graduated from Corning Northside High School. A gifted athlete, especially in baseball, Dudley was drafted by the Brooklyn Dodgers during his senior year. He later served in the US Army and, after his military service, attended the Cornell Culinary School. Dudley was an Elder in our church, serving on our Session and as a member of the Property Committee. He is survived by his wife, Marie, daughters Lisa and Tara, and by three grandchildren. Dudley was one of life's "good guys," and we will miss him.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORT

Recent Property Committee projects have included:

- Repaying of main church parking lot
- Replacement of wheel chair ramp with composite materials. (no more painting)
- Installation of industrial surge suppressor for the two main circuit panels
- Ongoing management of water and mold remediation followed by full insulation under sanctuary floor
- Continued care of outside property mowing, weeding and bush trimming, and leaf cleanup
- Monthly roof inspection
- Repairing gutter along the east side of the Church House
- Replacing ballasts and fluorescent tubes in our kitchen and social room
- Continued attention to our scheduled maintenance list items.

CELLAR PROJECT UPDATE

The ServPro project of cellar and basement clean-up is drawing to a close. The mold, caused by a malfunction of the sump pump, plus ground water seepage after heavy rains, has been mitigated. Any contaminated property has been discarded (example: lumber) or properly cleaned (example: the Christmas trees). Final testing is being done to be sure all areas are completely safe before ServPro considers the job done. Next, insulation must be replaced under the sanctuary; the property committee is currently obtaining quotes to complete this part of the project. Finally, new dehumidifiers will be purchased to maintain a dry environment and air quality. (NOTE: WE WOULD REALLY APPRECIATE IT IF THESE DEHUMIDIFIERS COULD BE DONATED BY MEMBERS OF OUR CONGREGATION. TALK TO MARY CHURCHILL OR ANY PROPERTY COMMITTEE MEMBER FOR MORE INFORMATION.)

The costly but necessary expense of this project reminds us that our church basement is for necessary storage and cannot be a collection site for unwanted items. The Boy Scouts will no longer be storing anything in the basement. Rummage sale collection will only take place during designated times shortly before the time of the sale.

PNC UPDATE

The Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) has the ultimate responsibility for nominating a minister to the congregation for election as our next pastor. The work of the PNC involves many different tasks and responsibilities as we work our way through the call process.

In October, we placed a classified ad in the bi-monthly magazine, "Presbyterians Today," to attract possible self-referring candidates who might read our ad and be drawn to this area and more specifically, to our church. Also, PNC member Jenny Dean contacted all seven of the Presbyterian Seminaries and arranged to have our ad posted on their individual websites. Our ad was posted as well on the Presbytery of Geneva website for a broader reach. This was all in addition to having



our Minister Information Form (MIF) posted on the Church Leadership Connection (CLC). As of October 15th, our MIF had received 89 hits on the CLC website.

To date, the PNC has viewed and evaluated a total of seventeen Personal Information Forms (PIFS) from a variety of candidates with various levels of experience. During the process of discernment, this list gets narrowed down through personal interviews and eventually, candidates are brought to a neutral pulpit where the PNC can hear them preach.

Your PNC has been meeting weekly now for months and more recently, bi-weekly, in order to interview each potential candidate via Skype, which is a video phone call. Each potential candidate has undergone two Skype sessions. During the first scheduled interview, he or she has been asked to respond to questions which are of a somewhat general nature or in some cases, more specific to our church.

The second Skype interview had the candidate answer a series of theological questions which were e-mailed to them in advance. We are happy to report to all of you that we have been told by the candidates who were interviewed so far that our theological questions are "excellent...better than most," "very engaging questions" and that "they show a real concern for connecting faith to every aspect of life!"

Your PNC members have also been very diligent in their efforts to contact all of the references listed on the PIF for any potential candidate. They generally did this as teams of two so as to not miss anything said by the reference who had been contacted. Our Presbytery also has conducted a Presbytery-to-Presbytery reference check for any potential candidate who we hope to bring to a neutral pulpit in our area. Additionally, potential candidates are told at this point that it is important for them to contact our references as well in order for the process to continue to move forward.

Especially at this exciting time as the PNC continues to move forward in a very positive way, we strongly encourage all members of the congregation to look at the enlarged flow chart for the call process which is posted on our church house bulletin board. As we are proceeding through the various required tasks on the chart, we have marked a large X through each box once that task has been completed. This allows all of you to see what the PNC has already accomplished while at the same time letting you see what we still have ahead of us to complete.

Remember that your PNC always has our church's best interests in mind as we travel through the often challenging and time consuming process of discernment in our search for the right person to be our new pastor.

Please continue to keep the PNC in your prayers, and also remember that it is "God's own choice" who will be our next pastor.

"SHOWER FOR MARY" & "GIFTS FOR JOSEPH" MISSION EFFORT ANNOUNCED

For the past seventeen years, our congregation has generously supported our "Shower for Mary" local mission effort during the season of Advent. In this program we have collected a variety of items for personal care and other needs for women and children served by the Salvation Army Safehouse. The Salvation Army Safehouse provides a comprehensive program for victims of domestic violence. Services offered include emergency shelter, counseling, advocacy, information/referrals, hotline services, justice system information and accompaniments, support group, and community education. Seven years ago we expanded our outreach efforts through a "Gifts for Joseph" program to help men served by the Samaritan Center. The Samaritan Center has been assisting individuals and families in need with emergency food, clothing, and prescription drug assistance for over thirty years. This program also facilitates enrollment to Medicaid, Family Health Plus & Child Health Plus and provides referrals to other resources and support services for longer term solutions. The Samaritan Center is located at 380 Main St., Elmira (734-4898).

SHARED BLESSINGS!

A COMMUNITY BASED GIVING AND SHARING PROGRAM SPONSORED BY THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF BIG FLATS, NY

The "Shared Blessings" program at our church is working hard to provide a "no cost/low cost" store for local people who are in need of clothing, personal hygiene supplies, some home goods, and other supplies. This will be housed in the upstairs Sunday School area over our church kitchen. We are asking the community to get involved, whether that be donations or volunteering or simply keeping your ears and eyes open for someone who is in need. We hope to work through referrals from the local community or companies. We are hoping that this becomes infectious and we will be able to get the whole community involved, not just our church members. Most of us are very fortunate, but there are plenty of people in our own community that do need help.

As we continue to work this out we have also decided to tackle a community mission project each month. In recent months:

- A Mother's Day Crib was filled with donations and given to a deserving young single mother in our community.
- Goodie Bags were filled with homemade cookies and given to the Horseheads Bus Garage and the Big Flats Elementary School.
- Volunteers from our church passed out free nutritious lunches to children at Blandford Park in Elmira.
- Volunteers from our church partnered with Corning Incorporated to offer a picnic at the Bath VA Hospital for our Veterans.
- We have just completed our "Shoe Drive" project by collecting pairs of shoes to help other countries develop entrepreneurial experience as well as providing shoes at a low cost to their communities.
- In October, we collected socks for distribution by local agencies. Socks are the most-requested items at homeless shelters and clothing distribution centers.
