Dear Friends,

As I write this final letter to you, I am remembering these words from Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 NRSV:

- 3 For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven:
 - ² a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted;
 - ³ a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up;
 - ⁴ a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance;
 - ⁵ a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing;
 - ⁶ a time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to throw away;
 - ⁷ a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak;
 - ⁸ a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace.

During our little over two years together we have experienced a number of the realities mentioned in this reading. We have had a baptism, a wedding, memorial services, Blue Christmases, Maundy Thursday services, community breakfasts and dinners and rummage sales, a Habitat weekend, Boy Scout Sunday, as well as other scouting events and the scout project resulting in a new crèche. There was the paving of the driveway, and a myriad of other Property Committee projects. There was a Bible study, singing, praying, preaching, fellowship, and friendship. There was also some tearing down of old ideas and planting of new ideas, some disagreements and some resolutions, some remembering and some forgiving. We have collected food and clothing, including hundreds of shoes for those in need. There was the continued thriving of the Food Pantry and the birth of Shared Blessings. We have laughed and cried, eaten many luscious meals and decadent desserts. We have said goodbye to beloved members who have moved on and welcomed others home. We have survived raging storms, ice, snow and endless rain.

Throughout it all, we have bonded and grown while experiencing a great deal of mercy, grace, joy and love! The Lord has blessed us in more ways than we can count. The Lord has certainly been with us and has shown us that what we think is impossible, God makes possible.

I have always believed that a pastor is called to a particular place, for a particular time, with

a particular purpose to a particular group of people in a particular community. We may have not accomplished everything that I had hoped for, yet still much was accomplished. It was always my intention and my responsibility to serve you in a particular way which included preparing you for your next pastor. The new pastor has been chosen and so it is my time to exit.

When Jesus prepared to leave his disciples, he found three promises to share:

- First, Jesus promised to make a home in his disciples' hearts. (John 14:23),
- **Second**, Jesus promised to fill the disciples with a spirit of courage and comfort. "The Holy Spirit...will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you". (John 14:26).
- **Finally**, Jesus promised to sustain his disciples with a special kind of peace. "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you" (John 14:27).

As Mary Lindberg writes in her book **The Graceful Exit**, "So we'll open the gifts Jesus gave us—a home in him, the courage to move on, the peace that will get us through many unknowns. And we'll trust that God is staying with those we love for many more seasons."

Please remember that you will always be a part of me. I thank you for the patience, kindness, mercy, grace, generosity and love that you have shown me! You are a lovely faith community of wonderful people and I wish you all the best in this new season that you are about to begin. May you continue to grow in faith, hope and love, worshipping the Lord with your whole heart, mind, body and soul, and caring for all God's people.

I thank God for you.

PNC UPDATE

Nearly a year after we began the discernment process on our journey to find a candidate to be our next minister, the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) called **Denise Stone** of Columbus, Ohio, to preach at our church on Sunday, December 16th. The service was followed by a special congregational meeting during which time members voted by secret ballot as to whether or not they wanted Denise to be our next minister.

For those of you who were unable to attend the service and the congregational meeting, I am pleased to announce that Denise was successfully voted in by a very strong majority vote! That morning, following the meeting, Denise signed the Pastoral Call Covenant (Terms of Call) which was also signed by **Joyce Dean** as Clerk of Session and **Rev. Beth Frigard** as Moderator of the Congregational Meeting.



A festive and delicious coffee hour/luncheon, which was put on by **Ann Slowik**, followed the meeting. During that special time of food, fun and fellowship, church members and friends had the opportunity to meet Denise and get to talk with her. Special thanks to Ann for providing this lovely meal...as always, it was wonderful!

The next step for Denise will be on Saturday, January 26th when she will appear before the Presbytery in Canandaigua in order to receive their approval. After that, the final step will be taken in the Call process. That will be the Ordination and Installation Service which (pending approval by Presbytery) will take place in the afternoon on Sunday, February 24th at the First Presbyterian Church of Big Flats. That morning, Denise plans to conduct our regular Sunday morning service for the first time.

During the Ordination and Installation Service, Denise will be ordained for the first time as a Presbyterian minister (she was previously ordained as an American Baptist minister) and installed as the minister of our church. This is a very important and special service which will be conducted by the Presbytery. All pastors in the Presbytery of Geneva will be invited to attend as well as our entire congregation. I encourage all of you to mark the date of February 24, 2019, on your calendars so you can be present for Denise's ordination and installation at our church.

I am very grateful for the wonderful members of the PNC who have served with me and gave many hours of their time, prayers, help and suggestions during the discernment process. We would not be where we are today without the efforts of all of those on the PNC. My heartfelt thanks go out to each and every one of them. They are: Jenny Dean, Ann Hayes, Sheila French, Pat Fitzgerald, Rocky Peters and Mark Slowik.

Special thanks also go to our Presbytery liaison, **Rehana Stanley**, for her guidance throughout the process. Others who helped us on this journey include: The **Rev. Dr. Betsey Crimmins, HPP, ACC, Pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Elmira, Meredith Tifft, Retired Chaplain for Care First and Rev. Beth Frigard**, our Interim Pastor, all of whom served as references for our Minister Information Form (MIF).

A big thank you also goes to **Bill Howells** for his great help in disseminating our PNC candidate information packet via email to members and friends of the church.

Two non-members who provided help during the congregational meeting on December 16th were **Barb Powell and Mary Churchill**. Barb escorted Denise out of the sanctuary and sat with her in Fellowship Hall during the congregational meeting, and Mary helped count the votes with me in the church office. A big thank you to both of them!

Many thanks also to my husband, **Tom Seem**, who assisted me in a variety of ways throughout the process. His patience and understanding during this time consuming and often difficult journey was greatly appreciated.

I will keep all of you updated following Denise's appearance before Presbytery in January and also on the details leading up to her Ordination and Installation Service on February 24th.

Please continue to keep Denise in your prayers, and also remember that it was always "God's own choice" who would be our next pastor. He held us in His arms and led us to Denise, and we are very blessed.

ADVENT MISSION DRIVES VERY SUCCESSFUL

Our congregation responded with great generosity to our 2018 Advent mission drives. Our "Shower for Mary" is an important effort which helps victims of domestic abuse at the Elmira Salvation Army's Safehouse, and our "Gifts for Joseph" program helps men (and families) served by the Catholic Charities Samaritan Center. PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORT

Recent Property Committee projects have included:

- A new manger was contributed by **Boy Scout Troop 87** and a new Nativity scene was purchased by the church.
- Pat and Tom Seem coordinated Christmas decorations and lighting.
- Meal preparation has been enhanced and energy saved with professional calibration of our gas stove.
- Our sanctuary floor was reinsulated with spray foam on 11/29 after completion of the ServPro mold mitigation project in the basement. Total cost of both projects (after \$10,000 in insurance money) was \$21,364.71.
- A dehumidifier was donated by **Hank and Joyce Schurr** and retrofitted for basement use by **Rocky Peters**.
- We contracted for a new gutter on parking lot side of church to prevent ground water saturation at the foundation: GutterPro to install 1/2/19.
- We contracted with **Ed Rhodes** to construct window well covers to prevent ground water saturation in the basement.
- Ballasts and fluorescent tubes were replaced in our social room.
- Property members periodically check the roof and ceiling of fellowship hall to pinpoint and fix a persistent leak.
- Committee members are working to install a motion sensor light outside the pastor's study.
- We made two required (minor) modifications to our boiler and passed inspection.
- We took the necessary steps to pass our annual Town of Big Flats Fire inspection.
- We continue to take care of our outside property -leaf cleanup and snow removal.
- Each month we give continued attention to our scheduled maintenance list items.

SHARED BLESSINGS UPDATE

Shared Blessings is a community-based giving and sharing program sponsored by our church. Recent programs have included a number of financial donations to people in need and a shoe drive which collected some **2,108 pairs of shoes, filling 84 bags, and earning \$557.60** to further the Shared Blessings outreach. In December, Shared Blessings supported our church's Advent drive by decorating a tree with donated hats, mittens, gloves, etc. and then adding these items to the "Shower for Mary" collection.

In January, Shared Blessing will be collecting stuffed animals. Details about this program will be announced during morning worship services.
